Philip H. Abelson, director of the Geophysical Laboratory of the Carnegie Institution, has been awarded the Hillebrand Prize by the Chemical Society of Washington. The award was made in recognition of his contributions to the paleobiochemistry and geochemistry of plant and animal remains, including the discovery of amino acids in fossils millions of years in age.

Herbert Insley, who retired in 1953 after 31 years with the National Bureau of Standards has been named recipient of the Albert Victor Bleininger memorial medal and scroll for "distinguished achievement in the field of ceramics." The award is presented annually by the Pittsburgh section of the American Ceramic Society. Among his many achievements in the ceramics field, Insley contributed to the utilization of synthetic jewels for bearings during World War II. The award was presented in Pittsburgh in March, 1963.
