Proceedings of the Fifty-Seventh Annual Meeting of the Mineralogical Society of America in Denver, Colorado

LARRY W. FINGER, SECRETARY

The fifty-seventh annual meeting of the Society was held on November 8–11, 1976, at the Denver Convention Complex and Denver Hilton Hotel. There were six technical sessions in petrology, three in mineralogy, and a symposium, "Magma Genesis in the Mantle," arranged by John Carman. The sessions were integrated with those of the Geological Society of America and its other affiliated societies.

The retiring President, E-an Zen, addressed the Society on November 9 on the subject, "The Phase-Equilibrium Calorimeter, the Petrogenetic Grid, and a Tyranny of Numbers." The annual luncheon of the Society followed President Zen's address. The Roebling Medal was awarded to Professor Carl W. Correns, who was introduced by Gustaf Arrhenius. The Mineralogical Society of America Award was given to Friedrich A. Seifert, who was introduced by Hatten S. Yoder, Jr.

At the annual business meeting, reports were presented by the Secretary, the Treasurer, and the Editor. The results of the election, the subject of the next Short Course, and other Council actions were announced.

1976 Council actions

The second meeting of the 1976 Council was held on April 11, 1976, and the third meeting was held on November 7, 1976. The principal actions of the 1976 Council are summarized.

Awards

The Council voted to award the Roebling Medal for 1977 to Raymond Castaing. The Mineralogical Society of America Award for 1977 will be given to J. G. Liou.

Husband-wife membership category

The Council voted to create a new membership category for married couples. Each individual will have full membership rights; however, there will be a single journal subscription for the couple. An amendment to the Constitution which will complete action on this change will appear on the 1977 ballot.

Publications

The 1976 Publications Committee (Benjamin A. Morgan, Chairman) sent letters to approximately 100 petrologists soliciting comments on the possible role of MSA in encouraging more petrologic publications in *The American Mineralogist*. Following recommenda-

tions of the Publication and Financial Advisory (S. W. Bailey, Chairman) Committees, the Council voted to authorize the Editor to publish up to 1400 pages per year (up from 1144) with the increment devoted to increasing the number of pages of petrology papers. The Council also voted to accept an arrangement proposed by Oxford University Press, publishers of the *Journal of Petrology*. In this arrangement, the members of MSA can subscribe to the *Journal of Petrology* at a rate equal to approximately 2/3 of the normal rate. In addition, MSA will be able to appoint one member to the Honorary Advisory Board of the Journal.

Short course

The Council voted to endorse the proposal for a Short Course on Zeolites to be held in conjunction with the Seattle meeting. F. A. Mumpton is the Short Course Convenor for 1977.

Actions of the 1977 Council

The first meeting of the 1977 Council was held on November 11, 1976.

The Council approved the budgets for the Society and *Mineralogical Abstracts*, and reappointed Brian Mason as Editor, Ann Garlington as Managing Editor, and A. F. Spilhaus, Jr. as Executive Secretary.

Committees

The Council voted to change all standing committees, except the Financial Advisory Committee, to a rotating basis where no individual would serve more than one year as chairman. The Financial Advisory Committee is to be on a two-year basis. The report of the Committee on Committees (F. D. Bloss, Chairman) was approved with changes.

Meteoritical Society

The Council voted to appoint a formal representative to the Meteoritical Society.

Kraus Fund

The Council voted to award the Kraus Research Grant during 1977.

Spring meeting of the Council

The 1977 Council will hold its second meeting in conjunction with the spring AGU meeting.

Report of the Treasurer for 1976

This report covers the period January 1, 1976, through December 31, 1976, denoted FY 1976. The accounting was done on the accrual basis, and the figures are therefore comparable with those of FY 1973–1975. The figures have been audited by Touche Ross, and Company, and in their opinion, present an accurate accounting of the Society's financial position. A copy of the full audit report is on file at the Society's business office, at 1909 K Street, N. W., Washington, D. C. 20006, and is available for inspection by any member.

The financial data for FY 1976 are presented in

Table 1 (Balance Sheet) and Table 2 (Statement of Income and Expense, FY 1976). Table 1 is in the same format as that presented last year; Table 2 is changed from the previous year so as to give a more complete description of the Society's financial transactions, and is in the form utilized by the Society's business office.

The Mineralogical Society of America continues to be in a sound financial position. Our new investment manager, Mr. William G. Campbell of New York City, who has been with us a year now, has done an exceptional job of restructuring our portfolio of stocks and securities. As given in detail in the report of the financial advisory committee for 1976, the market value of the entire portfolio increased from \$320,977 to \$401,590 in 1976. I believe we can begin 1977 with a very optimistic outlook as far as our finances are concerned.

The revolving fund which is designed to be non-profit showed a small decrease of \$1,618 due to preparation of the decennial index and reprinting of *Short Course Notes I*. The sale of these in 1977 should more than make up for this loss. The activities included within the revolving fund have certainly enhanced the

portfolio. The portfolio was restructured by our new investment manager, William G. Campbell, in order to take a more conservative approach to the market and to consolidate our recent rapid gains. Thirty-six percent of the total cost of the present portfolio is in bonds yielding an average of 7.2 percent. The remainder is broadly diversified in common stocks that are expected to have better-than-market appreciation. These stocks were selected to have a high potential discounted rate of return (18-25%), as judged by their present price/earnings ratio and their retention rate of earnings. The market value of the entire portfolio

increased 25.1 percent during 1976 from \$320,977 to \$401,590 (Table 1), and the value of the common stock portion appreciated approximately 34 percent. For comparison purposes, the Dow Jones Industrial Average increased 17.9 percent during 1976. Total dividends plus interest received during 1976 amounted to \$16,527.18 (Table 2). A capital loss of \$37,641.60 was sustained as a result of the portfolio restructuring (Table 3).

Report of the Editor (October 1, 1975-September 30, 1976)

During the past year the editorial office has been transferred from Blacksburg to Washington and the editorial team of Don Bloss-Mary Holliman replaced by Brian Mason-Ann Garlington. Handling of manu-

scripts was transferred to Washington in mid-October 1975; the January-February 1976 issue (which went to press October 13, 1975) was handled in its entirety by Dr. Bloss and Ms. Holliman, and the succeeding issues have been the responsibility of the Washington office.

Manuscripts received during the twelve months ending September 30, 1976, totalled 240, a considerable increase over the 197 received during the preceding twelve months; this increase is partly but not entirely accounted for by the 29 manuscripts deriving from the Geothermometry–Geobarometry conference. Some 80 manuscripts were in various stages of processing when the editorship was transferred.

Council authorized a maximum of 1144 pages for *The American Mineralogist*, Volume 61, 1976; the actual number of pages will be approximately 1260. The overrun is accounted for by Smith and Steele, "Lunar mineralogy," 59 pages, paid for by a special NASA grant (to be published in the November-December issue), and by additional pages authorized for the July-August issue to accommodate all the manuscripts submitted from the Geothermometry-Geobarometry conference. Table 1 summarizes the operations of *The American Mineralogist* for the year October 1, 1975-September 30, 1976.

The Editor expresses his appreciation to the Board of Associate Editors, whose efforts throughout the year have been essential to the efficiency and integrity
